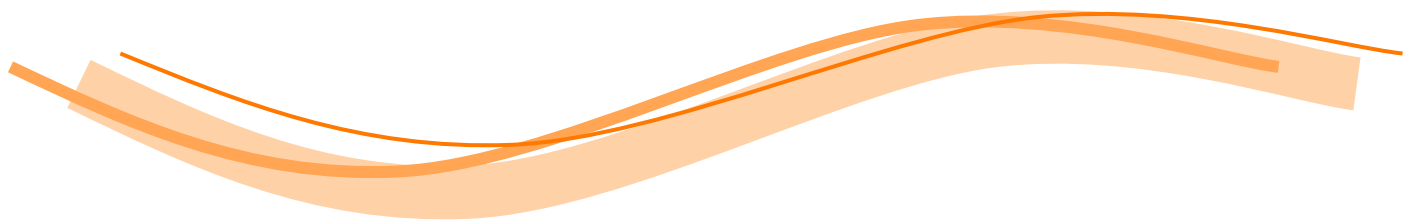

For a truly authentic Mexican experience - visit Huatulco. It's a Pacific paradise renowned for its relaxing atmosphere, beautiful beaches and feel of being the "real" Mexico. And for sun seekers – there is virtually year-round sunshine!

Huatulco is still relatively unknown to many vacationers and it is an area of pristine natural beauty. Much of its appeal is that, despite the fact that many luxury resorts have been developed along its magnificent bays, little has changed. Recognizing the ecological importance of this entire region, it has been designated a national wildlife preserve, and all development has been planned and carried out sensitively. In fact, several of the bays remain wholly undeveloped today and can only be accessed by boat.

Drive to the mountains, hike by the river side and swim in natural fresh water swimming pools. Enjoy an unforgettable experience, as you explore the jungle on a 4x4 adventure. Visit Pluma Hidalgo a town in the clouds, famous for its Pluma coffee. Taste the local cuisine or see handicraft production at a traditional weaving workshop.

Beginners and experts can try diving and snorkelling at one of the over thirty beaches. And if you are a golf enthusiast, enjoy a round at the challenging 18-hole Tangelunda Golf Course.

Take an all-inclusive trip to the 4 star Las Brisas Huatulco Resort, nestled beachfront on the western side of Tangelunda Bay and just 27 kms from Huatulco airport. The hotel has 484 rooms in many 3-storey buildings. Choose between Deluxe rooms and Brisa Beach Club rooms which have an ocean view and upgraded amenities, bathrobes and slippers in the room upon arrival and include access to an exclusive lounge with continental breakfast. The hotel has 5 à la carte restaurants (Middle Eastern, Mediterranean, Mexican, Grill & Seafood). Plus pools, bars, disco and a gym.

Escapades are exciting two day, one night trips away from your resort. From the Las Brisas Huatulco Resort, head out to visit a local town and a traditional market. Tour a coffee plantation, where brewing and cultivation techniques have been unchanged since the 18th Century. Learn about

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	<p>coffee making and have a home cooked lunch. Then continue on to San Jose de Pacifico, a small town high in the mountains. Take part in a cooking workshop at a local restaurant and stay overnight at an authentic Mexican hotel. The following day promises a hike in the mountains, a bird watching tour and more local towns before you return to your resort</p>
<b>Location</b>	<p>Huatulco is located on the Southern Pacific coast of Mexico in the state of Oaxaca where the foothills of the Sierra Madre del Sur Mountains meet the Pacific Ocean approximately 500 km south of Acapulco, Guerrero.</p> <p>Huatulco has 35 kms of coastline conformed of the nine bays with 36 beaches with clear and brilliant waters, on a total of 21 hectares, of which 16,400 are earmarked for the regeneration and preservation of the ecological balance, being a vital part of this project the Huatulco Wildlife and Marine Park, declared a National Protected Area in 1998.</p>
<b>Geography</b>	<p>Huatulco is divided into four main districts. Tangolunda is the area where the large upscale resorts are located; Santa Cruz is a small town with the main marina and Santa Cruz beach; La Crucecita, is another small town just inland from the beach area which provides support services to the area, and Chahué is an area between Santa Cruz and Tangolunda.</p> <p>The Bahias de Huatulco, (Bays of Huatulco) are actually made up of a series of nine bays and numerous small coves stretching along 26 kilometers of jagged coastline, including 36 white sandy beaches.</p>
<b>Name</b>	<p>Its original name is Santa Cruz Huatulco. The name Huatulco refers to the region encompassing Bahías de Huatulco, or the Bays of Huatulco. Huatulco is derived from a Nahuatl (Indian) word that means "place where people worship the cross." Legend has it that a white, bearded man brought a cross to Santa Cruz many years before the Spanish conquest. (Some believe he was one of the apostles.) The story goes that he converted the Indians to Christianity and then disappeared.</p>
<b>Population</b>	<p>Huatulco itself has only 8,000 inhabitants but the State of Oaxaca in which it is situated has a population of approximately 3.5 million.</p>
<b>Language</b>	<p>Spanish – but English is widely spoken in the coastal resort towns.</p>
<b>Currency</b>	<p>The Mexican Pesos – although the US Dollar is also widely accepted too. Currently (6 Dec 2013) \$1 Cdn = 12.1 Mexican Pesos.</p>
<b>Tipping</b>	<p>The average tip for service is 10-15% and one or two dollars per suitcase carried. Always check your bill first as tips may already be included.</p>
<b>Government</b>	<p>The United Mexican States are a federation whose government is representative, democratic and republican based on a presidential system. The President is Enrique Peña Nieto.</p>
<b>Documentation</b>	<p>Passports are required for Canadian citizens, but no Visa is necessary</p>
<b>Time zone</b>	<p>Huatulco is on Central Time, one hour behind Montreal and Toronto.</p>

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<b>Health</b>	There are no special health problems here and the hospital facilities are excellent.
<b>Safety tips</b>	In contrast to the sometimes lurid media accounts of the drug war in Mexico, this region – in common with most of the tourist regions of the country – is safe for vacationers. Just take the normal precautions that you would in your own town or city.

<b>CLIMATE</b>	
<b>General climate</b>	Sunshine can be expected about 330 days a year with the average temperature of 28C. The dry season extends from December to May and the rainy season is from June to November. The amount of precipitation has a definite effect on the local vegetation, being brownish in the dry season and very green in the rainy season.
<b>Today's weather</b>	Today is 30 Centigrade and sunny in Huatulco (7 Dec 2013)
<b>Best time to visit</b>	The winter season between December and April is perfect for Canadians – almost no rains and warm temperatures from its southerly location in Mexico.

<b>GETTING AROUND</b>	
<b>Getting There</b>	Transat Holidays have weekly direct flights between December 20, 2013 and March 21, 2014 and offer a choice of four hotels, plus excursions to help you enjoy your visit to Huatulco to the full.
<b>Cities</b>	The Huatulco area has three small towns: La Crucecita, Santa Cruz and Tangolunda. Getting between them is easy – they are short taxi rides away from each other, or there is a local minibus service. Santa Cruz is the main commercial and tourist hub, with lots of restaurants, discos and craft shops.
<b>Distances</b>	This stretch of coast is 480 km southeast of Acapulco.
<b>Boats</b>	There are several catamaran trips across the Bays of Huatulco, including the daily Seven Bays Tour which leaves from the harbour at Santa Cruz
<b>Trains</b>	There are no longer any operating trains in Oaxaca.
<b>Car Rental</b>	Rental cars are readily available at the airport, through travel agencies, and through the most popular U.S. car rental services.
<b>Buses</b>	There are three bus stations in Crucecita, all within a few blocks, but none in Santa Cruz or Tangolunda. The Gacela and Estrella Blanca station, at the corner of Gardenia and Palma Real, handles service to Acapulco, Mexico City, Puerto Escondido, and Pochutla. The Cristóbal Colón station (tel. 958/587-0261) is at Av. Riscalillo, Sector T. It serves destinations throughout Mexico, including Oaxaca, Puerto Escondido, and Pochutla. The Estrella del Valle station, on Jasmin between Sabali and Carrizal, serves Oaxaca.

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<b>ACCOMMODATION TYPES</b>	You will find a wide variety of accommodations from rooms for rent, small economy hotels, luxury oceanfront villas, vacation condominiums, bed and breakfasts, along with several luxury resorts standing on or near the shores of Tangolunda Bay. For the best of the all inclusive resorts, pick up the Transat Holidays brochure from your local travel agent.
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<b>LIFESTYLES</b>	
<b>Kids</b>	The younger kids will love the beaches of Huatulco and all the big resorts have great pools; most have kids' clubs too. They will also enjoy some of the eco-excursions to the jungle and the waterfalls.
<b>Teens</b>	Teens will love the relatively new 20,000-hectare "eco-archaeological" park, El Botazoo, at Punta Celeste, where there is a recently discovered archeological site. Hiking, rappelling, and bird-watching are popular activities there. This new development is all being handled with ecological sensitivity in mind.
<b>Romance</b>	Pamper yourself in the glow of a romantic Mexican sunset on a luxury yacht. There is nothing more peaceful and romantic than sailing across one of the Bays of Huatulco as the crimson sun dips into the deep blue waters of the Pacific.
<b>Honeymoons &amp; Weddings</b>	Many of the larger resorts in Huatulco will organize destination weddings – including the featured resort <b>Las Brisas Huatulco</b>
<b>Seniors</b>	Huatulco is safe, sunny and relaxing – which is why Seniors love the place so much.

<b>UNIQUES</b>	<p>Huatulco has achieved the prestigious <b>Green Globe Benchmarked Certificate</b> under the new Green Globe Certification program, which recognises the operation's commitment to operating at the world's highest environmental standard.</p> <p>Huatulco has spent considerable time benchmarking its energy and water consumption, waste production and disposal as well as implementing an integrated environmental and social policy. In particular it has achieved Best Practice results in Potable Water Consumption, Solid Waste Production, Resource Conservation (Paper consumed), Resource Conservation (Biodegradable pesticides) and Biodiversity. <b>Surprising</b>	One of Huatulco's famous landmarks is <b>El Bufadero</b> in Santa Cruz Bay. It's a rock formation that forms a blowhole. In Organo Bay there is another rock formation that resembles an old man's face.
<b>History</b>	Legends say the Toltecs and Quetzalcoátl came from this area. Quetzacoátl, according to a later legend, set an enormous and indestructible cross, which has never been found. Various people have passed through this area, including the Chatmos, the Zapotecs and the Mexicas. After the Spanish Conquest, Huatulco thrived as a port under Hernán Cortés' control serving as a vantage point for Spanish galleons and a distribution centre for supplies on the Pacific coast. The latter half of the 16th Century saw Huatulco attacked by Francis Drake and Thomas Cavendish - both of whom left their prints on the region's history and legends that continue to this day. Until resort development began in the 1980s, Huatulco was little known except as a coffee-growing area. In 1984, FONATUR (Fondo Nacional de Turismo), a government agency dedicated to the development of tourism in Mexico, acquired 21,000 hectares of land to develop a tourism center, similar to that in Cancun. The plan resulted in the improvement of roadways and other infrastructure. It also has populated areas mixed with "green zones" to make the area more ecologically friendly.
<b>Books</b>	<b>Frommer's Mexico</b> is the bible for travellers to Mexico.
<b>1000 Places to See Before You Die</b>	<b>El Dia de los Muertos</b> – Mexicans remember and celebrate their departed in this festival which normally takes place at the start of November. <b>Oaxaca's Saturday Market</b> – craft shopping in the most Mexican city of the Republic
<b>Must Sees</b>	<b>Oaxaca's Monte Alban</b> – see below under historical buildings

<b>SPORTS ACTIVITIES</b>	
<b>Golf</b>	<b>Campo de Golf Tangolunda</b> is one of the best golf courses on the Pacific coast of Mexico – which is high praise indeed. This 18-hole, par-72 golf course (tel. 958/581-0037) is adjacent to Tangolunda Bay. It has tennis courts as well for \$11 per hour. The greens fee is \$80 for 18 holes and \$64 for 9 holes; carts cost \$34.
<b>Fishing</b>	Huatulco is a deep sea fisherman's dream vacation destination. Sailfish, tuna, snapper, dorado and marlin are swimming in the coastal waters just waiting for the right bait. Charter a boat and enjoy a group fishing expedition. Fishing charters cost \$120 per person, for one to eight people; or select

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	from other options where the price varies with the size of the boat; a boat can be rented for 8 hours for \$450.
<b>Horse riding</b>	Guided horseback riding through the jungles and to Conejos and Magueyito beach makes for a wonderful way to see the natural beauty of the area. The ride lasts 3 hours, with departures at 9:45am and 1:45pm, and costs \$35 to \$45. Contact <b>Caballo del Mar Ranch</b> (tel. 958/589-9387).
<b>Hiking</b>	A recommended guide for both hiking and bird-watching is Laura Gonzalez, of <b>Nature Tours Huatulco</b> (tel. 958/583-4047 or 589-0636). Choices include a hike around Punta Celeste with views of the river, open sea, and forest, for sightings of terrestrial and aquatic birds. The 3 1/2-hour tour can be made in the early morning or late afternoon, and costs \$45. An 8-hour excursion to the Ventanilla Lagoons takes you by boat through a mangrove to view birds, iguanas, and crocodiles. The cost is \$80, including lunch. Tours include transportation, binoculars, specialized bird guide, and beverages.
<b>Cycling</b>	Local tour operators offer mountain biking day trips in the hills behind Huatulco for those looking for an active pursuit.
<b>Canopy Tours</b>	A popular Huatulco adventure activity is canopy tours. You glide from treetop to treetop, getting an up-close-and-personal look at a tropical rainforest canopy and the trails far below. Expert guides assist you to the special platforms, and you move from one to another using pulleys on horizontal traverse cables, while the guides explain the tropical flora surrounding you. They also offer assistance - and moral support - as you rappel back down to the forest floor.
<b>Diving</b>	Huatulco has 13 sites available to dive, which are located around marine fauna and coral reefs. Try <b>Hurricane Divers</b> if you are interested in diving and snorkeling. This professional dive centre offers tours, courses and great packages for its clients. All levels of the courses are offered in English.

<b>CULTURE</b>	
<b>Arts</b>	<b>The Museo de Arte Contemporáneo de Oaxaca</b> in Oaxaca exhibits the work of contemporary artists, primarily from Oaxaca state (which has produced some of Mexico's most famous painters). It also books traveling exhibitions. The 18th-century building merits a visit for its own sake. It's called the Casa de Cortés, and many locals say that it was built by order of Hernán Cortez after he received the title of Marqués of the Valley of Oaxaca.
<b>Music</b>	Ranchera, Mariachi and Sones are the traditional forms of music that can be heard throughout this region.
<b>Museums</b>	There are some excellent historical museums in Oaxaca which is a 30 minute flight away from Huatulco. The best is the <b>Museo Regional de Oaxaca</b> . The most treasured possessions are the artifacts from Monte

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	Albán's Tomb 7, which were discovered in 1932. The tomb contained 12 to 14 corpses and some 500 pieces of jewelry and art, making use of almost 3.6kg of gold and turquoise, conch shell, amber, and obsidian
<b>Festivals</b>	<p><b>Radish Night Festival</b> in December in Oaxaca Radishes are lovingly sculpted into everything from animals to saints and nativity scenes at Oaxaca's curious annual Radish Festival. The Zócalo fills with stalls, music and traditional dancing.</p> <p><b>Day of the Dead</b> in November (annual) Mexico's famous commemoration of the dead - el día de los muertos - is both a joyous and touching celebration. In Oaxaca, the people remember their ancestors by decorating the cemeteries.</p>

<b>Beaches</b>	<p>The beaches are the star attraction of Huatulco as a destination.</p> <p>The most centrally located bay is <b>Bahía de Santa Cruz</b>, which is just south of the town of La Crucecita. It is also the centre of commercial and tourist activities, with a large pier where cruise ships dock. Many resort offerings can be found here such as hotels, craft shops, discothèques, bars, restaurants, excursion agencies, sailboat excursions as well as scuba diving, snorkeling and jet skis for rent. The Capilla de Santa Cruz is where many weddings and baptisms are celebrated next to the sea. Playa Santa Cruz, is the best known of the beaches here. It is 250 meters long, with soft white sand and turquoise blue water.</p> <p>Heading east from Santa Cruz are the bays of <b>Bahía Chahué, Bahía Tangolunda and Bahía Conejos</b>. These are the more developed areas of Huatulco. Bahía Chahué is 2 km east of Santa Cruz and its name means "fertile or moist land" in Zapotec. It has a marina for large and small yachts along with three principal beaches; Chahué, Esperanza and Tejón. Even though these are wide beaches, their moderate surf makes them less-visited than those in Santa Cruz.</p>

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	<p>Three km east of Chahué is <b>Bahía Tangolunda</b>, which has five beaches; Ventura, Manzanillo, Tornillo, Tangolunda and Rincón Sabroso. Here the water varies between cobalt blue and emerald green. Most of the larger hotels are located on this bay. Residencial Conejos is 4 km east of Tangolunda and has some of the larger residential homes in the area, some of which are vacation rentals. The mouth of the Río (River) Copalita is slightly east of Bahía Conejos and it has a long zone of beaches.</p> <p>To the east of Río Copalita are beaches stretching all the way to the Isthmus of Tehuantepec. Two of these beaches are <b>Barra de la Cruz and Playa Mojon</b>. Some great surf waves can be found from these beaches. Barra de la Cruz is one of the best and easiest to access. Playa El Mojon can, at certain times of the year, have some decent waves for surfing and is also a great location to explore.</p> <p><b>Bahía Órgano</b> is named for the cacti that grow there. It is 240 meters long and only accessible by boat. <b>Bahía Maguey</b> is about 1/2 km long and is accessible by car. Both these bays have fine, white sand and waters of various colors of blue and green. <b>Bahía Cacaluta and Bahía Chachacual</b> are only accessible by boat, and there are absolutely no human constructions of any kind. <b>Bahía San Agustín</b> is the furthest west and the largest of all the bays. It has 1 km of beaches between 20 and 80 meters wide. There are also small islets inside the bay itself.</p>
<b>Wildlife</b>	<p>The <b>Sierra Madre Occidental</b> supports some of the richest biodiversity found anywhere in North America, boasting a wide range of wildlife species including white-tailed deer, jaguar, pumas, wild boars, ocelots, jaguarundi, coati mundi, skunks, badgers, coyotes, margays, rabbits, armadillos and iguanas.</p>
<b>Parks</b>	<p>To the west of Santa Cruz, the beaches are less developed and most of this area belongs to the <b>Parque Nacional Huatulco</b>. This is a protected area created in 1998. It contains 6,375 hectares of lowland jungle and 5,516 hectares of marine areas, encompassing the bays of Bahía Maguey, Bahía Órgano, Bahía Cacaluta, Bahía Chachacual and Bahía San Agustín. In these bays live the most important coral communities of the Mexican Pacific. 723 species of animals live in the park as well as a number of species of colorful fish, and it is open to scuba diving, bird-watching and hiking.</p>
<b>Waterfalls</b>	<p>Ecotours are growing in popularity and number throughout the Bays of Huatulco. The mountain areas surrounding the Copalita River are also home to other natural treasures worth exploring, including the Copalitilla Cascades. Thirty kilometers north of Tangolunda at 395m (1,296 ft.) above sea level, this group of waterfalls - averaging 20 to 25m in height - form natural whirlpools and clear pools for swimming. The area is also</p>

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	popular for horseback riding and rappelling.
<b>Historical Sites</b>	<p><b>Monte Alban</b> – A unique historical treasure near Oaxaca</p> <p>Monte Albán sits on a mountain that rises from the middle of the valley floor - or, rather, divides two valleys. From here you can see all that lies between you and the distant mountains. Starting around 2000 B.C., village-dwelling peoples of unknown origin inhabited the Oaxaca valleys. Between 800 and 500 B.C., a new ceramic style appeared, indicating an influx of new peoples, now called <b>Zapotec</b>. Around 500 B.C., these peoples began the monumental exercise of leveling the top of a mountain, where they would build Monte Albán.</p> <p>Very little of the original structures remain; they've either been obscured beneath newer construction or had their stones reused for other buildings. The Danzantes friezes date from this period.</p> <p>A centre of Zapotec culture, Monte Albán was also influenced by contemporary cultures outside the valley of Mexico. You can see Olmec influence in the early sculptures; more recent masks and sculptures reflect contact with the Maya. When Monte Albán was at its zenith in A.D. 300, it borrowed architectural ideas from Teotihuacán. By around A.D. 800, the significance of Monte Albán in Zapotec society began to wane. Although most likely never completely abandoned, it became a shadow of its former grandeur. At the beginning of the 13th century, the Mixtec appropriated Monte Albán. The Mixtec, who had long coexisted in the area with the Zapotec, began expanding their territory. At Monte Albán, they added little to the existing architecture; however, they seem to have considered it an appropriate burial ground for their royalty. They left many tombs, including Tomb 7, with its famous treasure.</p> <p>Monte Albán centres on the Great Plaza, a man-made area created by flattening the mountaintop. From this plaza, aligned north to south, you can survey the Oaxacan valley. The excavations at Monte Albán have revealed more than 170 tombs, numerous ceremonial altars, stelae, pyramids, and palaces.</p> <p>Begin your tour of the ruins on the eastern side of the Great Plaza at the I-shaped ball court. This ball court differs slightly from Maya and Toltec ball courts in that there are no goal rings, and the sides of the court slope. Also on the east side of the plaza are several altars and pyramids that were once covered with stucco. Note the sloping walls, wide stairs, and ramps; all are typical of Zapotec architecture and reminiscent of the architecture of Teotihuacán. The building, slightly out of line with the plaza (not on the north-south axis), is thought by some to have been an observatory; it was probably aligned with the heavenly bodies rather than with the points of the compass.</p> <p>The south side of the plaza has a large platform that bore several</p>

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	<p>stelae, most of which are now in the National Museum of Anthropology in Mexico City. There's a good view of the surrounding area from the top of this platform.</p> <p>The west side has more ceremonial platforms and pyramids. Atop the pyramid substructure are four columns that likely supported the roof of the temple at one time.</p> <p>The famous building of Los Danzantes (the dancers) on the west side of the plaza is the earliest known structure at Monte Albán. This building is covered with large stone slabs that have distorted naked figures carved into them (the ones you see are copies; the originals are protected in the site museum). There is speculation about who carved these figures and what they represent, although there is a distinct resemblance to the Olmec baby faces at La Venta, in Tabasco State. The distorted bodies and pained expressions might connote disease. Clear examples of figures representing childbirth, dwarfism, and infantilism are visible. Because of the fluid movement represented in the figures, they became known as Los Danzantes - merely a modern label for these ancient and mysterious carvings.</p> <p>The Northern Platform is a maze of temples and palaces interwoven with subterranean tunnels and sanctuaries. Take time to wander here, for there are numerous reliefs, glyphs, paintings, and friezes along the lintels and jambs as well as the walls. In this section of the ruins, you are likely to see vendors discreetly selling "original" artifacts found at the site.</p> <p>Leaving the Great Plaza, head north to the cemetery and tombs. Of the excavated tombs, the most famous is Tomb 7, next to the parking lot. It yielded some 500 pieces of gold, amber, and turquoise jewelry, as well as silver, alabaster, and bone art objects. This amazing collection is on display at the Museo Regional de Oaxaca.</p> <p>As you enter the site, you'll see a museum, a shop with guidebooks to the ruins, a cafe, and a craft shop. Video camera permits cost \$5. The site is open daily from 8am to 6pm. Admission to the ruins is \$4. Licensed guides charge \$15 per person for a walking tour and are well worth the money.</p>
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<b>OTHER ACTIVITIES</b>	
<b>Shopping</b>	Silver, crafts, artwork, tequila, coffee and resort wear are all good souvenirs. Black clay pottery and figurines are a regional speciality and the local ceramics are colourful.
<b>Markets</b>	Each resort boasts some shopping, plus there are colourful markets in La Crececita and Santa Cruz. In Oaxaca, check out the <b>Benito Juarez market</b> , at the corner of the zocalo, for handicrafts and food items. The <b>Artisans' Market</b> , near the chocolate factories of Mina Street, has better deals than most shops on

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	hammered tin, woodcarvings, weavings, rugs, blouses and wooden toys. The <b>Abastos Market</b> is the main city market, located on the edge of town. Gird yourself for navigating a splendid labyrinth of Oaxacan cheese, clothing, housewares, sugar skulls, homeopathic medicine counters, sweet breads, wooden furniture, baskets, masks and other treasures. Remember to bargain, but bargain gently.
<b>Nightlife</b>	Nightlife is centred on the all inclusive resorts of Huatulco. The Las Brisas Huatulco resort for instance has evening entertainment and music.
<b>Casinos</b>	There are no casinos in Huatulco.

<b>CUISINE</b>	
<b>Food</b>	<p>Seafood is plentiful in the area, with red snapper, prawns and lobster in abundance.</p> <p>For the same reasons its people are so diverse, Oaxaca boasts a tremendous diversity of regional cuisine, nicknamed "Land of the Seven Moles". An abundance of fruits and vegetables are grown in the central valley, tropical fruits are found in the north and fish and shellfish dominate the cuisine of the south. Oaxaca is also known for Oaxaca cheese (quesillo) which is now exported around the world and even made in many locations in the United States.</p> <p>Corn tortillas are the staple food but a vast array of foods are prepared from corn dough, from entomatadas and empanadas to tamales and tlayudas. Black beans are also a common ingredient, as is the pasilla chile which gives many dishes their distinct hot, smoky taste and red color.</p> <p>A breakfast specialty, generally only available in Oaxaca, is huevos oaxaqueños - eggs poached in a chili-tomato soup. Another specialty is chapulines, or roasted grasshoppers, a popular dish in the state's central valleys region. Chapulines are eaten after the rains begin and through early autumn.</p>
<b>Coffee</b>	There are a number of coffee plantations which are still in operation and give tours, including Finca (farm) Las Nieves, Finca Monte Carlos, Finca Margaritas, Finca El Pacífico and Finca La Gloria. Finca El Pacífico is known for the organic coffee it produces called "Pluma Hidalgo," and it is surrounded by waterfalls and ravines. Finca La Gloria is known for the butterfly sanctuary "Mariposario Dain Biguid", where dozens of species of butterflies can be seen and the "Llano Grande Falls".
<b>Mescal</b>	Mezcal, or mescal, is a distilled alcoholic beverage made from the maguey or agave plant that is native to Mexico. The word "mezcal" comes from Nahuatl "mexcalmetl," which means agave or maguey. This plant grows in many parts of Mexico but most mezcal is made in Oaxaca. There is a saying attributed to Oaxaca regarding the drink:

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	"para todo mal, mezcal y para todo bien también" (for everything bad, mezcal, and for everything good, too.)
<b>Restaurants</b>	<p>Try La Casa del Abuelo, the Topsy Blowfish and the Quinta Real for some of the best of local cuisine.</p> <p>Highly recommended: <b>El Sabor de Oaxaca</b> in Crucecita:  This is the best place in the area to enjoy authentic, richly flavourful Oaxacan food, among the best of traditional Mexican cuisine. This colourful restaurant is a local favorite that also meets the quality standards of tourists. Among the most popular items are mixed grill for two, with a Oaxacan beef filet, tender pork tenderloin, chorizo (zesty Mexican sausage), and pork ribs; and the Oaxacan special for two, a generous sampling of the best of the menu, with tamales, Oaxacan cheese, chiles rellenos, pork mole, and more. If you're feeling adventurous, try the salty grilled chapulines (grasshoppers, a Oaxacan specialty). Generous breakfasts include eggs, bacon, ham, beans, toast, and fresh orange juice.</p> <p>Av.
